Opportunities for Psychologists in Israel

The majority of employment opportunities for psychologists are in the public sector, especially in the fields of educational, clinical, and developmental psychology. Many psychologists are employed by the Ministry of Health, which administers community mental health stations (*tachanot lebrivot hanefesh*), as well as centers for treatment of substance abuse and in-patient mental health facilities.

Psychologists are also employed by other government ministries, such as the Ministry of Social Affairs and the Ministry of Education, as well as by hospitals, the health funds, counseling centers, and in private clinics.

Generally speaking, salaries are higher in the private sector than the public sector. The opportunities for psychologists in private practice are limited only by your their capability of attracting clients.

In recent years, the fields of social and industrial psychology have expanded. Private companies employing psychologists in these fields often offer relatively high salaries.

Note: this is the third edition of this booklet, and hereby nullifies any previous editions. The information contained in this booklet is based on data provided by various official sources. Details are subject to change. In case of any discrepancy, the regulations of the Ministry of Immigrant Absorption, the Ministry of Health, and other official bodies will prevail.



Professional Integration In Israel



The following steps are necessary in order to become professionally integrated in Israel:

1. Obtain professional recognition by obtaining a psychologist's license and becoming listed in the Psychologists Book (*Pinkas HaPsikologim*).
2. Obtain a license to enable you to practice as a specialist, or to begin or complete specialization.
3. Intensive Hebrew study.
4. Job search or referral to a place where you can specialize.

Registration



In order to practice as a psychologist in Israel, it is first necessary to become registered in the Psychologists Book and to have a psychologist's license. Such registration confers official recognition as a psychologist. Registration is processed through the Psychology Registration Committee of the Ministry of Health. See Useful Addresses.

The "Psychologists Law" (1977) mandates that a citizen or resident of Israel who holds at least a secondary degree (master's) in psychology that has been conferred either in Israel or overseas and that is recognized by the Council for Higher Education may



apply for listing in the Psychologists Book. The degree must meet the following criteria:

- A. The degree has been conferred by an institution that is recognized according to regulations of the Psychology Registration Committee, which works in conjunction with the International Association of Universities (IAU), the American APA and institutions of higher education overseas.
- B. The institution offers studies in psychology at the bachelor's or master's level, or studies leading directly to a degree in psychology at a higher level. It is permissible to study for any kind of degree at another university provided that studies for a degree in psychology were undertaken at a recognized institution.
- C. In countries in which there is no differentiation between master's degrees and graduate degrees, or bachelor's degrees and master's degrees, studies for a master's degree in psychology must encompass no less than 4 full academic years (eight semesters) on condition that this is the accepted custom in that country.
- D. The curriculum includes at least 36 yearly credit-hours or 72 semester credit-hours of study.
- E. At least 16 credit hours out of the total number included in the curriculum of study are devoted to psychology studies at the master's level or higher, and students are required to write a thesis.
- F. If a given study program does not require the writing of a thesis, 4 yearly credit hours of research methods and statistics may be accepted as a substitute; in such a case, 40 yearly credit-hours of psychology studies are required.
- G. When calculating the total number of study hours as outlined in paragraph "D" above, only lectures and seminars will be taken into account. Work-



shops, practical work, research hours, independent study, supervision, library hours, etc. are not recognized.

- H. When calculating study hours, the Registration Committee will recognize up to 20 semester hours (or 40 credit points) of psychology studies taken at the bachelor's level in a department of psychology at a recognized institution.

Core Curriculum

The basic accepted study program at the bachelor's level must include the following courses:

- 2 yearly hours (four credit points) of statistics or research methods, or experimental psychology.
- 8 yearly hours (16 credit points) in 4 basic psychology subjects, 2 courses from each group (each course equals 2 yearly hours).



Group One

1. Introduction to Psychology
2. Diagnostic methods or testing
3. Cognition, psychology of thought processes, psychology of perception or cognitive psychology
4. Physiological psychology or neuropsychology

Group Two

1. Psychopathology or abnormal psychology
2. Personality theory principles
3. Developmental psychology
4. Social psychology

2. Persons who have a Ph.D. in psychology but do not have a bachelor's or a master's degree in psychology, and who meet the requirements outlined in sections D and F, must have studied the basic courses listed above as part of their academic program.

General Information

1. Correspondence-course studies, long-distance studies, and on-line studies via the Internet are not recognized.
2. The title of 'Ph.D' or 'Psy.D' will be listed on the license of a person who has a Ph.D. or Psy.D, and who studied for Ph.D. or Psy.D degree in a faculty of psychology in a recognized institution.

When applying for registration in the Psychologist's Book, you must include the following documents. All documents must be photocopies certified by the Ministry of Health and translated to English if necessary:

- Transcripts of undergraduate studies and your bachelor's degree



- Transcripts of your graduate degree studies and your master's degree.
- Transcripts of your doctorate degree studies and your Ph.D degree, along with authorization from the university that your doctoral thesis was written within the auspices of the psychology department.
- Authorization from the Police that you do not have any criminal record.
- Israelis who studied overseas must have authorization from the Ministry of the Interior of departure and return to Israel during the period of overseas study.



Note: The Registration Committee evaluates every request for registration in the Psychologist's Book according to requirements of the "Psychologist's Law" and according to its judgment.



Obtaining Recognition as a Specialist

The Professional Committees adjacent to the Council of Psychologists (*Moetzet HaPsikologim*) decide whether you are eligible to be certified as a specialist or to begin training for specialization. You may apply only after you are listed in the Psychologists Book and have received licensing as a psychologist.

There are six separate professional committees for each recognized field of psychology.

The following fields are officially recognized in Israel:

- Clinical Psychology
- Developmental Psychology
- Educational Psychology
- Rehabilitation Psychology
- Social, Industrial, and Organizational Psychology
- Medical (Health) Psychology

Your application form should be submitted to the Secretariat of one of the Professional Committees with the following documents attached:

1. A copy of your license and authorization of registration in the Psychologists Book.
2. Verification of employment and experience, including details of the type of employment, the responsibilities that you held, and the supervision you received.
3. Recommendations from past employers, especially from supervisors.

You must indicate on the form which field of specialization you are interested in. The documents will be forwarded to the appropriate Professional Committee.



Following review of your documents, the Professional Committee decides if you will receive a recommendation for a specialization license, or whether it is necessary to complete further studies, another practicum, or a further course of specialization. Each professional committee determines a suitable study course, practicum, or course of specialization for each candidate, based on the standards and requirements for specialization in their particular field.

A specialization course usually lasts for two consecutive years in a full-time position, or a longer consecutive period in a part-time position. The Professional Committee may be able to guide candidates to possible locations for specialization work, and will advise you on the number of hours and specialization subjects required. Note that it is necessary that the Professional Committee approves your choice of location for your specialization training, as well as the specialization subjects and your supervisors. You must notify the Professional Committee if you change your place of employment or your specialization subjects. At the conclusion of the specialization period, you must supply the Professional Committee with verification of your training, and submit a request to stand for examinations. Examinations are administered twice a year (November and May). The dates are publicized in the daily press. All documents must be sent to the Professional Committee no later than four months prior to the examination.

The Ministry of Immigrant Absorption's Employment Department may in some cases provide assistance for new immigrants who need to begin or complete their specialization. Consult with a personal absorption coordinator at branch offices of the Ministry for more information.



Recognition as a Supervisor

You can receive a license as a supervisor in any of the recognized specializations. In order to receive a license as a recognized supervisor you must have a minimum of three years of experience as a specialist. The training period for specialization as a supervisor is an additional three years. For more information consult the Professional Committee that you belong to.



Hebrew



The importance of Hebrew ulpan as part of the absorption process cannot be overemphasized. The language skills you acquire in ulpan will benefit you through every phase of your absorption, including finding a place to live, looking for employment, and building relationships with veteran Israelis. During ulpan you will learn about and experience Israeli society, politics, and culture, while getting to know those institutions, authorities, and agencies that you will be dealing with in the future.

As an immigrant psychologist a special effort is required on your part to facilitate communication with those seeking your professional advice and treatment.

When looking for a job, you must be able to negotiate effectively with prospective employers, and, in many cases, employers will demand at least a working knowledge of Hebrew. Once you are employed, the ability to communicate easily with co-workers will facilitate your integration in the workplace. Furthermore, lectures, seminars, and workshops are usually conducted in Hebrew.

It is important to register at a Hebrew ulpan as soon as possible after obtaining new immigrant status in Israel. New immigrants are usually eligible to receive a subsidy of their ulpan study only within the initial 18 months following the date of aliyah.

In order to find out about ulpan options, consult your personal absorption counselor at a local office of the Ministry of Immigrant Absorption. Your counselor will confirm your eligibility for a subsidy of your ulpan study

and refer you to non-residential, Ministry-approved ulpanim in your area.

Finding a Job



Once you are listed in the Psychologists Book, you can then apply directly to institutions that employ psychologists, such as hospitals, schools and the health funds.

There are a number of additional steps you can take to facilitate your job search. You can limit yourself to one or two, but the more avenues that you pursue, the more effective your search is likely to be.

Official Frameworks for Finding Employment

Assistance from the Ministry of Immigrant Absorption

Your Ministry of Immigrant Absorption personal absorption counselor will work with you to devise an employment track that suits your needs. Assistance can include access to the Ministry's database of employment openings, referrals to training or retraining courses, and participation in salaries. Further, during your first year following aliyah, following the conclusion of Absorption Basket payments, you can receive assured income payments from the Ministry during your job search. To be eligible, you must register with your personal absorption counselor, and report to the counselor according to your personal employment program. Consult with a personal absorption counselor at a branch office of the Ministry of Immigrant Absorption for details.



The National Employment Service

The National Employment Service, a division of the Ministry of Industry, Trade, and Labor, is a government employment service. Assistance includes job placement and referrals to training courses. The Service differentiates between academics/ professionals and non-academics, and offers separate services, either in a separate unit of the Employment Service office, or on different premises. You can locate the office nearest you via the Employment Service Website: www.taasuka.gov.il.

The first time that you go to an Employment Service office, bring with you a copy of your degree(s)/ diploma(s), your *te'udat oleh*, and your *te'udat zehut*. It is usually necessary to first have your degree certified by the Bureau for Evaluation of Overseas Degrees of the Ministry of Education (see above). You will also need to have a Hebrew version of your CV. If necessary, an Employment Service clerk can assist you in preparing a CV.

Job seekers are required by law to register with the Employment Service in order to receive unemployment benefits **following** their first year in the country. During your first year you can receive assistance from the Ministry of Immigrant Absorption. See above.

Finding Work on Your Own

Beyond the official sources of assistance, you may also have to look for work on your own.

To begin with, the newspaper help-wanted sections may sometimes have job advertisements for psychologists. While the English-language newspapers carry some ads, the majority is to be found in the Hebrew press.



There are a number of personnel companies and head-hunting agencies throughout the country. You can find them on the Internet and listed in the *Dapei Zahav* (Yellow Pages) telephone directory.

Numerous governmental and private-sector bodies in Israel have web sites, which often include listings of job openings or links to their personnel departments. Even if no specific openings for psychologists are posted, it can often be worthwhile to research sites in order to probe any niches you might fit.

The English-speaking immigrant associations can often provide vocational counseling and help to link you to potential employers. You can also consult the AACI's on-line Jobnet site (www.jobnet.co.il) which contains listings for a variety of professions.

It is a good idea to network. Speak to colleagues, veteran immigrants, and representatives of organizations. Attend conferences and seminars whenever you are able to. In Israel, word-of-mouth is often an effective source of job leads. Don't hesitate to let as many people as you can know that you are looking for work, and follow up on any tips they may offer. Many positions are filled without ever being advertised.

The Center for Absorption in Science

Immigrant psychologists who are involved in research, and meet eligibility requirements, can consult with the Center for Absorption in Science. See Useful Addresses.

The Center, part of the Ministry of Immigrant Absorption, aids in employment and grants assistance for further projects as outlined in the pamphlet entitled "Scientists and Researchers" (see the order form at the



back of this booklet). Information is also available on the Ministry of Immigrant Absorption Website.

Accreditation of Degrees and Diplomas

The Ministry of Education Bureau for Evaluation of Foreign Academic Degrees and Diplomas (*HaLishka LeHa'arachat Toarim Academi'im VeDiplomot MiChul*) is the accrediting body in Israel for all foreign degrees. Accreditation of your degree is generally necessary for determining your salary level, particularly for employment in the public sector.

Getting your overseas academic degrees and diplomas accredited in Israel can take up to several months. It is suggested that you begin tending to the matter, including the translation of certificates, immediately upon your arrival in the country, or even before. In order to obtain accreditation from the Bureau for Evaluation of Foreign Academic Degrees and Diplomas, you must take the following steps:

- Bring your original degree and course transcripts, as well as photocopies, to the Ministry of Education Bureau for Evaluation of Foreign Academic Degrees and Diplomas. See Useful Addresses. If you are unable to supply an original degree, you may be asked to obtain a "Letter of Eligibility" (*michtav zeka'ut*) from your university, detailing your entitlement to a degree.
- Complete an application form. Forms are available at the Bureau. Fill out only "Part A" of the form and attach the following documents:
 - An authenticated copy of the original degree certificate (diploma).
 - An authenticated copy of your university or college transcript from each institution where you have completed a degree. The transcript should include the following:



- Date of registration, date of commencement of studies, date of completion of studies.
- A transcript of all courses taken and credit points received.
- A summary of courses and prior studies that were recognized by the institution and earned credit points.
- Location of studies.

- Certificates that attest to prior study.

- Notarized Hebrew translations of the above documents, if the originals are in a language other than English.

- Bring your *te'udat zehut* with you.
- If you have changed your name, you will be required to include a marriage certificate or a notarized declaration of the change.
- Submit the application form and all the relevant documents listed above. You must submit all originals and photocopies. The Ministry will return originals to you.

Following the submission of your documents, there is no need to approach the Ministry of Education in person. Your accreditation will be sent by mail.



Psychology Studies in Israel



You can study psychology in Israel at the undergraduate, graduate and Ph.D levels. All of the major universities offer programs, as well as many of the regional colleges.

Eligible new immigrants may be able to receive academic counseling and financial assistance from the Student Authority (*Minhal HaStudentim*). For more information, consult the Student Authority (see Useful Addresses). Information is also available on the Ministry of Immigrant Absorption Website (www.moia.gov.il).



The Israel Psychologists Association

The Israel Psychologists Association (*Histadrut HaPsychologim B'Yisrael*) is the professional union for psychologists. Its responsibilities include:

1. Representing psychologists in government and public institutions.
2. Advising and supervising beginning and immigrant psychologists.
3. Distributing information on current research and developments in psychology.
4. Establishing minimum fees for psychological services in private practices.
